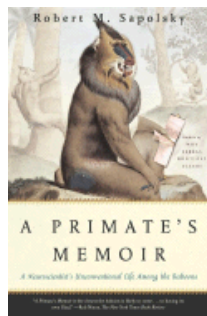


# Enduring Questions: The Mark Collier Lecture Series

Incorporating his innovative scientific research with humor and compassion Dr. Robert Sapolsky is a MacArthur “Genus” fellow, a professor of biology and a research associate at the National Museum of Kenya. 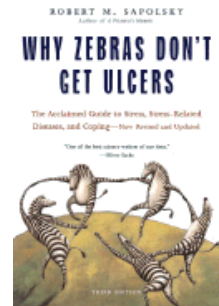

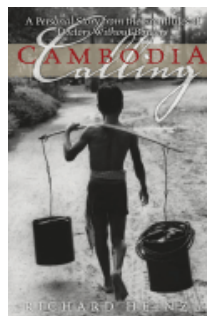

Passionately committed to providing humanitarian relief throughout the world, Dr. Richard Heinzl earned his medical degree from McMaster University in 1988. Soon after, he founded MSF Canada - Doctors Without Borders. He spent a year in Cambodia and became the organization's first field volunteer. “In the beginning I did this by speaking to anybody who'd listen,” says Heinzl. Then years later, MSF Canada has sent more than 650 medical and non-medical volunteers overseas, has chapters in 18 countries and won the Nobel Peace prize in 1999. He remains committed to the belief that one day we will live in a world where borders will be meaningless.
